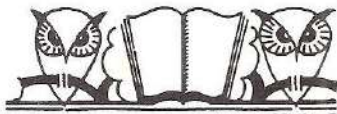


Introduction To Music

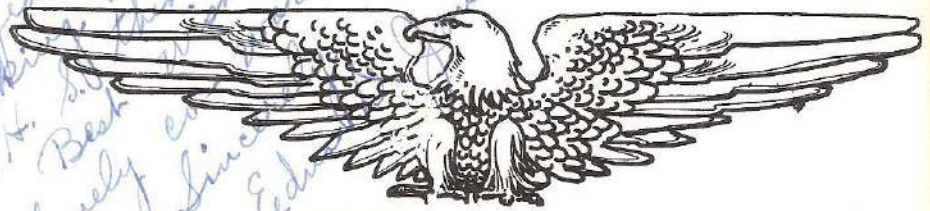


STUDIES
